Motion

Appetite may decline because he is so interested in everything else and he isn't growing as rapidly Can combine a vertical and horizontal crayon stroke to make a cross

Copies a circle

Can combine 3 cubes to build a bridge

Builds tower of 8 blocks

Builds tower of 9 blocks

Pedals a tricycle

Climbs on easy nursery playground toys

Can dodge, throw, stop-go, turn sharp corner

More nimble on feet - no longer walks with arms outstretched - swings them as adults do

Runs without falling much

Self Help

Dresses partially - depending on mood; puts on shoes and undresses almost entirely

Puts on some of own clothing

Buttons up some clothing, but may need help

Can put on shoes and unbutton some buttons

Holds cup by handle, tips head back to get last drip

Washes self

Dries own hands

Can run errands

Thinking/Speech

Loves to talk

Uses plurals, past tense, personal pronouns, prepositions

Is curious - asks "what?" "where?" "when?"

Asks frequent questions to which he already knows the answers

Likes to learn new words

Can count to 3

Can compare 2 objects, which requires a 3 step logic

Likes to compare 2 objects

Can follow 2 commands involving "on," "under," or "behind" (without gestures)

Understands simple explanations

When asked, points to 6 parts of the body (hair, nose, eyes, feet, hands, and mouth)

Combines several words, such as "Daddy catch fish" or "Gramps go home"

Makes 3-4 word sentences

Names several objects, such as car, chair, key, fork, and box

Knows his first name

Knows last name, sex, street on which he lives, simple rhymes

Is responsive to rhythm, has enough control to reproduce sound patterns

Can recognize familiar melodies and sing simple songs, not always on pitch

Can make a choice and abide by it

Asks help if he needs it

May not be able to do 2 things at once, as talk and eat

Can suggest his liking for a meal

Social/Play

Often wants to play alone with toys

May still play by self quite happily, but is more likely to be playing beside other children (parallel play) and will later move into more cooperative play

Enjoys playmates

May help a shy child if this is suggested

Has no sex preference in play

Begins to combine planes, trains, and cars with his block play

Shows order and balance in block building

Can wait turn in play and games

Has more flexible personal relations

Will "read" from picture books

Enjoys watching people at work, steam shovels, cement mixer in operation

Helpful in household chores (wiping dishes, putting things away, running simple errands)

Progressed from "I" to "We"

Needs large range of play materials to satisfy his widening play interest

Needs toys for imaginative play indoors

Needs "exercise" equipment and toys for outdoors

Likes paint, crayons, clay

Uses varied and rhythmical strokes in painting and drawing

Likes to have his picture and artwork saved

Very good imagination

Hasn't made clear distinction between what is true and what is make-believe

May have imaginary playmate

Affect

Good equilibrium

Happy and contented, enjoys self quietly

Emotional as well as physical self-control

Friendly, helpful

Mildly affectionate

Sure of self, less turned in on self

More ready to accept suggestions

Assertion/Anger

Increased self-control and less aggression

Increased use of language may take place of physical aggressiveness

Anger now aroused less by interference with physical activity and more by interference with plans and possessions

Aggressiveness is now expressed in works as well as actions

Can get almost as much relief from anger and resentment by wreaking vengeance on an imaginary person as on a real one

Needs help in finding ways to get rid of troublesome feelings without harming others or being made to feel guilty
